Hello From Hollywood!

Summer on the Great White Way
(Part 2 of 2)

Despite last week's closings of several Broadway shows, there's plenty to enjoy for all ages. Here are more recommendations of recently opened shows if you're planning a weekend getaway to the Big Apple:

Last chance to see "Blithe Spirit" by Noel Coward and starring Rupert Everett, Christine Ebersole, Jayne Atkinson and this year's Tony Award-winning legend, Angela Lansbury. While many in the audience consider Everett to be eye-candy, Lansbury is deliciously sweet and hysterically funny as Madame Arcati, the semi-bumbling medium hired to communicate with the departed. When Ms. Lansbury's off-stage, the play tends to lose its pacing; however, when she's back moving around like a dervish, the action fully comes to life...and so does the departed.

"Next to Normal" stars Alice Ripley, this year's Tony Award-winning for Best Actress in a Musical about wife and mother who suffers from bipolar disorder - and yes, it's a musical. The story delves into the layers of a woman with a serious illness and its impact on her family. A pop-rock opera in the vein of "Rent," each character's point-

of-view is painfully revealed in song, from isolation, abandonment and electric-shock therapy. The show is not for everyone, but each actor gives 100-plus percent of blood, sweat and real tears. Aaron Tveit, overlooked at this year's Tonys, has a powerful voice that thunders through the house along with the audible sobs in the show's final minutes.

Tickets to "Billy Elliot: The Musical," with music by Elton John and lyrics by Lee Hall, are almost impossible to score, so this show might be something to consider for a future trip if you buy now. The three actors who shared the Tony for Best Actor in a Musical rotate performances as Billy; each delights as does veteran Gregory Jbara (Billy's dad), Tony winner for Best Featured Actor in a Musical.

Other long running shows include: "Jersey Boys," "Wicked," "Avenue Q," "In the Heights" and "The 39 Steps." Full price and premium seats can be purchased online in advance and discount tickets may be available by going to playbill.com, broadwaybox.com and theatremania.com with a per ticket service charge.

What's On PBS This Week

Vermont Public Television Program Highlights for July 5 to 11:

July 5: Sunday at 8 p.m., "Nature" looks at the uncertain future of the king of the African savannah in "The Vanishing Lions."

At 9 p.m., "Masterpiece Mystery!" presents the first of four new "Miss Marple" tales with Julia McKenzie in the title role. Agatha Christie's spinster sleuth finds a disturbing parallel between the murders of a businessman and his family and a nursery rhyme.

July 6: Monday at 7:30 p.m. on "Profile," Fran Stoddard talks with Gretchen Morse, executive director of United Way of Chittenden County and a former state legislator.

At 9 p.m. on "History Detectives," the team of experts looks at historical mysteries, including a gun that may have belonged to a member of Al Capone's gang.

July 7: Tuesday at 8 p.m., "Nova: Secrets of the Samurai Sword" reveals the art and science behind what many consider the perfect sword.

At 9 p.m., astrophysicist Neil DeGrasse Tyson hosts another episode of "Nova scienceNOW." Stories include the discovery of genes for Alzheimer's and autism and using computers to authenticate paintings.

July 8: Wednesday at 7:30 p.m., the new series "Roadside Stories With Bob Wilson" continues with the host setting up a "roadside stand" to gather stories in Southington, Conn.

At 8 p.m., a short-run summer series called "Time Team America" begins. In each episode, scientists have three days to uncover the buried secrets of an archaeological dig. In this first

episode, the team visits Fort Raleigh in search of the nation's roots at Roanoke Island.

At 9 p.m., a four-part series "The Ascent of Money" debuts. Historian and author Niall Ferguson leads a global trek through the history of money. He begins by examining how it evolved from a crude system of coins to a global financial system.

At 10 p.m., "Wide Angle: Heart of Jenin" tells the story of a Palestinian boy, killed by Israeli soldiers, whose parents donate his organs to help Israeli children.

July 9: Thursday at 7:30 p.m., "Food Trip With Todd English" pursues culinary adventures in Tel Aviv.

At 8 p.m., the two-part special "Walking the Great Divide" concludes its breathtaking journey along the Continental Divide Trail from Canada to Mexico.

At 9 p.m., the series "Inside" shows what it took for the crew to put on the Rolling Stones' free concert in Rio de Janeiro for more than a million people.

July 10: Friday at 10 p.m., "P.O.V." presents "Life Support Music." A filmmaker chronicles the experience of Jason Criger, a fast-rising guitarist who, in 2004, suffered a near-fatal brain hemorrhage.

July 11: Saturday at 8 p.m., "The Thin Blue Line" returns to the VPT Britcom lineup. Rowan Atkinson stars as the pompous head of a small police station. In the first episode, local students are doing wacky stunts for charity.

At 10 p.m., "Austin City Limits" encores Jakob Dylan with songs from his debut solo album.
